

What does Spanish look like at Holy Trinity CEP School?

Our curriculum is designed so that children progressively develop their knowledge and understanding of the language. Through the teaching of a range of topics, children develop a bank of vocabulary that can be used to communicate orally and in writing.

Children in EYFS and Key Stage 1 gain a basic knowledge of some greetings, numbers and colours.

In Key Stage 2, Spanish is taught discretely weekly and follows the Kapow scheme of work. Lessons are a mixture of speaking, listening, reading, writing and cultural awareness, taught through a variety of approaches.

Spanish is an important part of a broad and balanced curriculum, where teaching can inspire a lifelong interest in language and linguistics. Through the Spanish lessons, children develop their knowledge and understanding of another country and culture.
